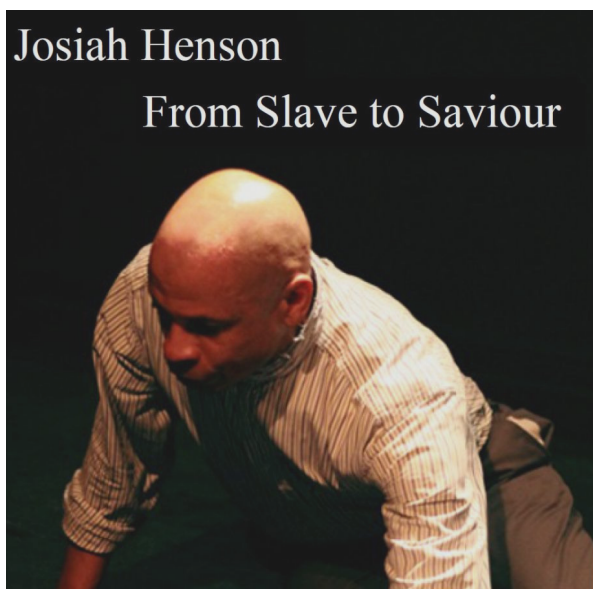


World Premiere to Benefit LLF

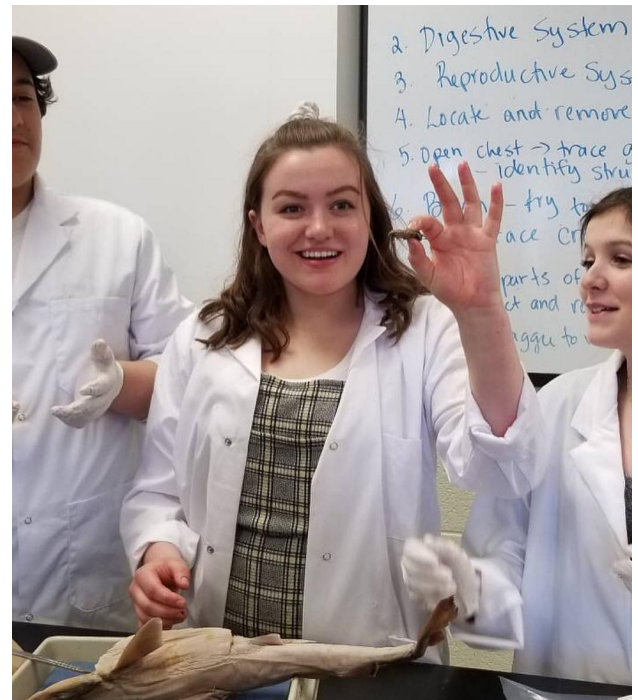
Napanee District Secondary School NASA (Napanee Academic Science Association)

The NASA mentorship program at Napanee District Secondary School fosters confidence and learning in math and sciences through a variety of workshops and one-on-one activities. The NASA mentors, who are senior science students, participate in a number of Queen's University and Loyalist College science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) outreach events, and then share their new learning with the Grade 9s as well as Grades 7 and 8 students from feeder schools.

Ryleigh Rioux, a Grade 12 student at Granite Ridge Education Centre in Sharbot Lake, turned her knowledge about drone mapping into a summer business. For the past two years, Ryleigh has been participating in the school's Above and Beyond drone program, originally funded by the Anna & Edward C. Churchill Foundation in 2016.

Ryleigh completed her drone pilot licence this spring and mapped Malcolm and Ardoch Lakes thanks to a grant from North Frontenac Township. Ryleigh said planning was perhaps the biggest part of her job. "Flying over water and collecting video data is difficult because of the reflection and refraction," she said. "I'll be controlling the take off and landing of the drone but the computer does much of in-flight deployment."

Lake Effects Robotics will be introducing the FIRST LEGO League to elementary students this fall thanks in part to a CFKA grant totalling \$14,870. This mentorship program incorporates elements of the arts, literacy, numeracy, and technology. Students develop critical thinking and team-building skills, basic applications in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM), and even presentation skills. Teams research a real-world problem such as food safety, recycling, energy, etc. and then are challenged to develop a solution.
