


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Seuls - Authors: Mélanie Baillaigré

L'enfant au désert - Pierre Rabhi et Claire Eggermont






Je m'appelle Maryam - Maryam Madjidi

Jusqu'à ce que quelqu'un lui demande: "Comment tu t'appelles?"




Souris - Raina Telgemeier

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




Braiding Sweetgrass for Young Adults - Authors: Robin Wall Kimmerer; adapted by Monique Gray Smith

With informative sidebars, reflection questions, and art from illustrator Nicole Neidhardt, Braiding Sweetgrass for Young Adults brings Indigenous wisdom, scientific knowledge, and the lessons of plant life to a new generation.

On a journey to uncover her family's story, Spotted Fawn travels through time and space to reclaim connection to ancestors, language, and the land in this essential graphic novel.

In the dreamworld, she bears witness to a mountain of buffalo skulls, a ghostly monument to the slaughter of the buffalo—a key tactic to starve and contain the Indigenous People onto reservations.

Spotted Fawn must travel through her own family history to confront the harsh realities of the past and reignite her connection to her people and the land. Her darkroom becomes a portal, allowing her glimpses into the lives of her relatives. Guided by her ancestors, Spotted Fawn's travels through the past allow her to come into full face—like the moon itself.



City of Dragons: The Awakening Storm - Author: Jaimal Yogis



- A Cell Phone: Avoid contact with Dad at all costs. Even when G'ma starts acting stranger than usual.





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




Surviving the City (Vol. 1) - Author: Tasha Spillett-Sumner

Surviving the City (Vol. 2) - Author: Tasha Spillett-Sumner


Dez and Miikwan's stories continue in this sequel to Surviving the City...

Will Dez be comfortable expressing her full identity? And will her community relearn the teachings and overcome prejudice to celebrate her for who she is?




Fish in a Tree - Author: Lynda Mullaly Hunt

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


New Kid - Author: Jerry Craft

This middle grade graphic novel is an excellent choice for tween readers, including for summer reading.




This is our Rainbow - A collection of works (various authors)

Indigenous families from Nations across the continent gather at the Dance for Mother Earth Powwow in Ann Arbor, Michigan.



They are the heroes of their own stories.



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


The Serpent's Secret - Author: Sayantani DasGupta




Thanks A Lot, Universe - Author: Chad Lucas
